March Chapter meeting

A chapter meeting with, 19 members in attendance, was held on March 6th at Charlotte's Restaurant. New members Kevin and Craig Patton were welcomed and inducted. Our membership continues to grow with 4 additional approved applications and Raphael Rispoli transferred from Florida Society. The Color Guard continues to support events including Princeton and the Washington's Birthday event. Our Americanism and website reports were submitted to the National society. The chapter newsletter received an "A" from National. The budget was presented and approved with one amendment to cover the constant contact fees. Compatriot Fred Fonseca was awarded a Betsy Ross car flag for his support of the chapter for chairing several committees and his support of America 250.

Fort Mifflin

The January 9, 2024 storm wreaked havoc on the Fort Mifflin infrastructure. There was much damage and the roof on the officer's quarters was ripped off. The Fort solicited the public for support in the amount of \$50,000. The membership was solicited for a goal of \$1.000 and raised \$1,530.00. This, and a \$1,000 check from PASSAR, were sent to the foundation.

March 30, 2024. The Color Guard, in coordination with The Regimental Brewmeister and PCCSAR compatriot Michael Carver, supported a fundraiser at the Fort. This included Color Guard training, with some members of the public conscripted into service, as well as a "Purging of the Kegs". This ceremony is where beer was poured "into the Delaware River", in the spirit of the devised floating mines that were made from beer kegs dumped into the Delaware River upstream of Philadelphia by David Bushnell in 1778, with the intent damage British ships. We had good camaraderie and most importantly, Matt Murdo who was manning the gift shop, announced the fort took in about \$1000 that day. Photos are on the Facebook page.

Solar Eclipse

April 7, 2024 (the day before the eclipse) Richard Wall House, Elkins Park, Pennsylvania.

The Regimental Brewmeister and PCCSAR compatriot Michael Carver, dressed as David Rittenhouse, explained this special astronomical event as well as recent computations completed on the size of the solar system. These were derived from the 1769 observations of the Transit of Venus (a similar event where Venus passes between the Earth and the Sun casting a shadow) and the solar eclipse in 1778.

April 8, 2024 (eclipse day and founding Father David Rittenhouse's 292nd birthday) Historic Rittenhouse Town

The Regimental Brewmeister and PCCSAR compatriot Michael Carver, as David Rittenhouse, was present in the observatory again, at David Rittenhouse's childhood home in Germantown for the solar eclipse. He demonstrated the observation of this event using period equipment. This event was on television and can be seen on our Facebook page.

April Chapter meeting

Our guest speaker was Dave Tatum, History teacher at Upper Darby High School, Vietnam vet, and member of the Pennsylvania Veteran's Museum. A stipend of \$200 was provided to the Veteran's Museum. He spoke of his assignments for his students to do a research paper on Vietnam veterans from Delaware County who paid the ultimate price. These papers were presented to the Delaware County Historical Society. A tour of the Veterans Museum followed.

We publish our emails on the PCCSAR website for legitimate communications to and from our officers. Our color guard season began out of state where two PCC guardsmen and one member of the Lady's Auxiliary participated in the reenactment of the Battle of Princeton. Afterward four guardsmen represented the PCC at the Battle of Princeton National Color Guard Event.

The PASSAR Winter Board of Management meeting on February 3rd was hosted by Conococheague Chapter in Chambersburg. The Colors were presented by PCC/PASSAR Color Guard Commander Fred Fonseca, PCC President Steve Kopsick and former PCC President Bill Baker. Continental Congress Chapter President Ed Kopsick also participated.

Continental Congress President Ed Kopsick traveled from York Pa. and fell in with the PCC color guard. At Washington Square, PCC President and guardsman Steve Kopsick presided over a wreath laying at the tomb of the Unknown Soldier. Afterward we marched to the sound of the pipers to Independence Hall. There, President Kopsick presided at the second wreath laying at the statue in honor of George Washington. From there, the guard led an entourage of PCC members and guests to the Museum of the American Revolution, where Lady's Auxiliary member Randi Fonseca took the traditional photo of the Guard posed behind the cannons. From MOAR, it was off to the reception at Glory Beer Bar for victuals and libations. Continental Congress Chapter President Ed Kopsick was gracious enough to fill in at the last minute to be the guest

speaker and gave an informative and inspirational talk on how he works the SAR Traveling Chest program.

Our annual Color Guard training was held for a third time at Ft. Mifflin, with the help of the Fort Brewmeister, guardsman Mike Carver. Mike created a "Dumping of the Kegs" program, and enlisted the help of the PCC Color Guard to fundraise for the badly needed repairs of the officer quarters roof, that was blown off by a storm.

Washington Memorial Chapel at Valley Forge



The stained glass windows in Washington Memorial Chapel at Valley Forge had been untouched since the 1950's, outside protected by plexiglass that clouded over the years, shutting out sunlight through the beautiful stained glass. Windows on the chapel walls, left and right, tell the story of the nation's founding and high over the front doors tell the life of George Washington. Over the altar is the biblical story. Through its charity organization, Washington Memorial Heritage, support to restore the windows was sought. Each side window was removed, releaded and repaired, and external thick clear glass was added for protection, at a cost of about \$100,000 per window. Artisans did the lead and glass work in a professional laboratory. The effect is striking now as the sun lights the windows. Various organizations like PSSR, its Color Guard, Huguenot Society, the Cincinnati, and individuals stepped up and the work is almost finished. It took several years.

SAR Compatriots David Humphrey, MD and Lanny Patten, with their DAR wives, dedicated the Anthony Wayne window officially to the national organizations,

NSDAR and NSSAR as the brass plaque describes. The bottom panel shows then VP Thomas Jefferson commissioning George Rogers Clark to open the West (years before the Lewis and Clark mission). The restored window was dedicated at a service two years or so ago. Those who visit the Chapel at the Lancaster SAR Congress in July should see it. There usually is a brochure in the back of the Chapel that tells the story of the windows, which are each one a magnificent work of art.

He is a past General Anthony Wayne C.A.R. Grandparent of the Year recipient. And last but not least, "first husband" of a Jeptha Abbott DAR Honorary Regent and Past DAR state officer Ann Patten.
