I often get questioned on the uniforms worn by the Chapter's Color Guard. For the most part these are patterned after the uniform worn by the Commander in Chief's Lifeguard, a unit formed in 1776 when Washington was overseeing the siege of Boston. He directed his commanders to select four men from each regiment who would form his personal guard. An illustration of the flag of the Commander–in–Chief's Guard is shown below.



As you know, most of the Patriots that joined the Continental Army came directly from their homes with the clothes they had on their backs and the muskets they owned.

On page 7 of McGuire, Thomas J. (2000), *Battle of Paoli*, Mechanicsburg, PA: STACKPOLE BOOKS, he writes about the departure of Washington's Army from Philadelphia: "Early on Sunday morning, August 24, 1777, coats of many colors reflected in the windows of Chestnut Street as leather-helmeted dragoons led Washington's army through Philadelphia. Green sprigs in the hats of the troops passing the State House not only lent an air of festivity to the march, but also provided an element of uniformity. It was just about the only uniformity present. Some of the dragoons in the column wore red coats with blue facings; others were clad in white jackets with sky blue lapels; others had on uniforms of brown faced with green. Many of the horsemen wore linen hunting shirts and a mixed bag of clothing and accoutrements ranging from 'like new' to 'sorely distressed.'"

My research in this area is not complete, but my theory is that when Washington's Lifeguard took up residence in Valley Forge their clothing was far from uniform and it took well into the Revolution to get them uniforms similar to those worn by the Chapter Color Guard.

Please join the Color Guard as we celebrate Washington's Birthday on Saturday, February 17, 2018, at City Tavern. PCC History Review 1978-1979

At the Annual Meeting on November 15th, 1978 Harry Woolever, Jr turned the gavel over to the newly elected president Henry B Brown, Jr. Secretary C Leslie Hunsberger declined reelection due to reasons of health. Compatriot Hunsberger was a stalwart of the chapter serving as secretary for many years after his 1962 presidency. Paul K Brown, brother of president Henry B Brown, Jr, accepted the post of secretary. A check of \$250 was given to Compatriot Hunsberger "as a token of our appreciation for his long, faithful and valuable services." President General Calvin E Chunn did the induction of the new officers.

Of much surprise to me was a letter in the chapter documents from Harry Woolever, Jr to President Brown citing "Reasons for disenchantment." It lists an array of items that are offensive to him. In particular, is the \$3094 deficit in the state society budget and how that could be allowed to happen. Perhaps the fact that they pay some of their officers and members to keep its books and records has something to do with it. And finally the last sentence: "I have become so thoroughly disenchanted that further service to the society is unthinkable. Best wishes." His disenchantment was short as he shows up a bit later.

The Treasurer's Report of 1/31/1979 shows a balance in hand of \$ 2728.73. The Washington Birthday Celebration was again this year at the Engineer's Club with busses provided to haul folks to Independence Hall for the wreath setting service and return. There was a small Color Guard of hearty souls with flags at the Washington Statue. 84 attendees at the luncheon. The Church Service in 1979 was in the Arch Street Presbyterian Church on April 20th with Rev Todd, D.D., Litt.D. and chaplain of the chapter. His sermon was "Preserve the Ancient Landmarks" The annual picnic was again held at Hibernia Park near Coatesville on July 8th.

The annual Constitution Day luncheon was on 9/22/1979 at the Benjamin Franklin Hotel. Under the command of Paul K Brown, the Color Guard led a procession of those seated at the head table. Cost \$9.00. Attendance 216 with 207 payees. The guest speaker was Judge Wilson King Barnes, Past President General of SAR. At the Executive Meeting of November 5, 1979, one of the items discussed was the possibility of transferring the custody and responsibility of Washington Square Park to National Park Service.

In a previous History Review I discussed the purchase and sale of the 16th St property in Washington. After which the property on Massachusetts Ave was purchased as the National Headquarters. Subsequently, it was learned a fine marble property near downtown Louisville, KY had come on the market at a most attractive price. After 19 years at the Massachusetts Ave property, repairs and maintenance were required. The decision was made to sell and move National Headquarters to Louisville. There was a period of time between the sale of the Washington property and the move to Louisville when the National Headquarters was temporarily located in Arlington, VA.
