2024 National Congress

The 134th NASSAR Congress took place from July 10th to the 16th in Lancaster, after meticulous planning, spanning 4 years. The successful execution of the event was attributed to the exceptional coordination of co-chairmen Davis Wright and George Clarke. The committee members and volunteers dedicated an immense amount of personal time to guarantee the seamless implementation of the schedule. In addition to Davis and George, kudos and huzzahs go out to Fred Fonseca, State Society Color Guard Captain, Randi Fonseca, John Whiteside, McRay Bostick (captain of the Day Captains), and Becky Moyer from the Ladies Auxiliary. If you should see these folks, please express your gratitude and acknowledge their excellent work.

Continental Congress President and dual member Ed Kopsick and PCC president, yours truly missed the host reception to support the Eastern Regional CAR annual black-tie meeting to represent PASSAR. A check from PASSAR in the amount of \$250 was presented.

Elections were uncontested except for Treasurer General and Registrar General, so the actual voting was for these two positions. The new executives are as follows: PG Darryl Addington (Tennessee), Secretary General Michael Elston (Virginia), Treasurer General William Greenly (Georgia), Chancellor General Edmon McKinley (Alabama), Genealogist General Gary Green (North Carolina), Registrar General T. Brooks Lyles (Georgia), Historian General Jeffrey Thomas (Virginia), Librarian General Keith Weissinger (Washington), Surgeon General John Turley (West Virginia), and Chaplain General John Vernon Welkner, III (Kansas).

The color guard performed excellently and supported presenting and retiring the colors at the memorial service and bench dedications at York and Washington Chapel in Valley Forge. Escorting the ring for the "ring ceremony" was a great honor for yours truly and Captain Fred Fonseca from the Philadelphia Continental Chapter as well as for Ed Kopsick of the Continental Congress Chapter (and dual member with PCC) and Gene Moyer of the Maryland Society. These 4 individuals were chosen out of all the color guard members in the nation to guard George Washington's ring during the installation of the newly elected PG, Darryl Addington, M.D. (Tennessee SAR). He was only allowed to wear it for a short time when he had to surrender it (to go back into the vault) and received a replica.

During this congress, a significant topic of discussion revolved around the proposal to increase the fees for both initial and supplemental applications by \$50. The decision was so contentious that a formal count had to be conducted. Ultimately, the resolution passed with 128 in favor and 124 against. I voted no. This goes into effect on September 1st. Some resolutions involved the executive committee for National and were inconsequential for us.

The PCC was awarded third place for the PG Activities Award and we received a certificate.

Philadelphia Continental Chapter Sons of the American Revolution Glimpses of Past Presidents

Earlier this year, a short article appeared in the January Newsletter about Harry P Glynn, who was the first recognized President of the Philadelphia Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution, from 1901 to 1908 when his death occurred. The "merger" of Philadelphia Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution and the Continental Chapter did not occur until many years later. Following Harry Glynn's death in 1908, Mr Clarence Pryor Wynne(1876-1961) became President of the Chapter and remained in that position for just about a year. Mr. Moses Veale became chapter President in 1911, and remained in office about six years, dying in 1917 in his 85th year. He was succeeded to the chapter presidency by Eugene C Bonniwell, who served as chapter President from 1918 to 1921.

This brief article will review some aspects of their lives.

CLARENCE PRYOR WYNNE was born in Philadelphia PA October 13, 1876 and died June 30, 1951, following a fall that had occurred on June 21 in the state of Washington. In 1903, Mr. Wynne married Mary Gray John at St James Episcopal Church in Philadelphia. She died in 1905 and Clarence Wynne remarried Elizabeth Warren, who died in 1951, only a very short time after Mr. Wynne had died. Clarence Wynne was in the real estate and insurance business. He later became connected with the Munyon Remedy Company, which was a patent medical firm founded in 1892 in Philadelphia. He rose up to become Vice President of Munyon Remedy Company and was elected President of this company in 1922. Mr. Wynne was a prominent figure in fraternal and civic groups. He later located in Scranton PA and became President of the Scranton Chamber of Commerce. He was a member of several organizations in Philadelphia, including the Philadelphia Consistory (he was a 32nd degree Mason), a member of Lulu Temple and served as President of the Sons of the American Revolution (the Philadelphia Chapter) during 1909 and 1910. Mr. Wynne also served as an agent for the United States Court in Philadelphia, being an overseer of some bankruptcy and reorganization proceedings.

MOSES VEALE served as President of the Philadelphia Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution from 1911 until his death in 1917. Mr Veale joined the Sons of the American Revolution in 1905, claiming his membership as a descendant of Delany Sharp of New Jersey, when he was past age seventy two. Mr. Veale was born November 9, 1832 in Bridgeton, Cumberland County, New Jersey, the son of Moses Veale, He became an attorney, and in later years, a health officer for the city of Philadelphia. Mr. Veale's obituary notice on July 28 1917, from a Wilkes Barre PA newspaper reads "War veteran dies after a long illness at the age of 85, in Philadelphia July 28, 1917, a Captain in the Civil War, a medal of honor recipient for actions at Wauhatchie, Tennessee, a survivor of the horrors of Libby Prison, and who was wounded five times during the Civil War." Burial was in Laurel Hill Cemetery-West. He fought in the Battles of Gettysburg, Chancellors-ville, Antietam, and Cabin Creek. He was married to Emma McDonald (1844-1914).

JUDGE EUGENE CLEOPHAS BONNIWELL, SR

Mr. Bonniwell was born September 25, 1872 in Philadelphia PA and died June 3, 1964 in Philadelphia PA. He married Madeleine Helene Cahill who lived from 1875 to 1929. After her death, Judge Bonniwell married Roberta C. Ranck in 1934. He was an attorney who practiced in Philadelphia PA and later became a Municipal Judge, serving forty years in this position. He ran for Governor of Pennsylvania in 1918 and 1926. He was defeated both times, but was the first Roman Catholic to run for Governor.

Mr. Bonniwell served as President of the Philadelphia Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution for three years, from 1918 to 1921. He was succeeded to the chapter Presidency by Herman W Fernberger.

John F Mitchell, Past President, Philadelphia Continental Chapter
